



MARK McPHERSON DISCOVERS GILROY'S RAILROAD HISTORY

Museum Volunteer Mark McPherson inherited his interest in trains. His father and grandfather, had 90 years of working in the industry between them! This definitely influenced his choice of research topics. His interest in the railroad's impact on Gilroy's growth and development has kept him engaged for the last six years. Using the Museum's microfilm reader, Mark began methodically searching the newspaper archives starting with the 1869 issues of the Gilroy Advocate. He has gradually worked his way through the many editions of the local newspaper, copying railroad advertisements and schedules, articles on derailments and train wrecks, and proud announcements of the construction of Gilroy train stations.

Through these newspaper articles Mark has documented the impact of improved transportation on the Gilroy community. Henry Miller is mentioned as shipping his cattle from his Bloomfield Ranch rail stop, rather than herding them to his



South San Francisco slaughter house. Early passenger service to San Jose, San Francisco and eventually Monterey, enabled town folk to reach those destinations without a 40 mile or more stagecoach ride, and allowed them to return on the same day. During World War II, railroad advertisements heralded its services as the main transportation for soldiers and equipment to the Pacific theater, thus proving its worth in the war effort. Later on, farmers from the Salinas Valley and Gilroy are recorded as shipping fresh produce to eastern markets in refrigerated rail cars.

Mark's research has revealed that Gilroy has a connection to the early formation of the Southern Pacific railroad. In its early years Southern Pacific began by buying up small independent railroads or by creating the appearance of small companies through many different paper companies. The Santa Clara & Pajaro Valley Railroad (1868-1870) was one of these companies. The railroad was formed to lay track from San Jose to Gilroy, and it did so with Southern Pacific men, machinery, and rolling stock. A year-and-a half after its March 13, 1869 Gilroy arrival, the railroad was merged with Southern Pacific.

When he is finished, Mark will have documented over 150 years of Gilroy's railroad history. The railroad made Gilroy the early shipping hub of south county and until the rail line was extended, the terminus for goods traveling south by wagons to Hollister and west to Monterey. Mark's efforts in documenting Gilroy's railroad history is an important and lasting gift to his community.

- 1. **HISTORIC DESIGN AWARD** for a new building in the downtown area that complements the original historic buildings or enhances the Downtown Historic District area
- 2. **HISTORIC COMMERCIAL BUILDING AWARD** for a building at least 50 years old in the downtown Historic District or on an Historic Site that restores, retains or preserves the building's historical, cultural or architectural values.
- 3. **HISTORIC HOUSE AWARD** for a home that is at least 50 years old that is an outstanding example of restoration and renovation. Exterior only.
- 4. **CERTIFICATE OF COMMENDATION** for residential, commercial or "other". This could be for new construction, restoration, renovation, additions, landscaping, painting or significant improvement.




Who was Massey Thomas? Why is He Important?

His name is probably on the deed to your home! In 1849 he crossed the plains to California for the gold rush. He visited the Gilroy area the next year and decided this would be a wonderful place to farm and raise his family. In 1852 Massey returned with his wife Phoebe and children, bringing 300 head of cattle with him. This time he stayed, buying nearly 500 acres and growing wheat, barley and fruit in addition to his livestock.

The family established their homestead south of the Luchessa Avenue (formerly Thomas Road) mostly on land where the Gilroy Sports Park is located. He bought this land from heirs of the Castro family who owned the Las Animas Rancho, a huge Spanish land grant covering the west side of Gilroy. Massey Thomas was not only one of our earliest settlers but was also a community leader. His was one of the families who founded the Christian Church in 1855.

Henry Miller (the Cattle King) came to Gilroy in the 1860s and also bought a great deal of land in Gilroy. By 1871 he owned 80% of the former Las Animas Rancho and he wanted more exact definition of the boundaries of his land. In 1879 he sued Massey Thomas and 800 Gilroy property owners to settle the matter, resulting in the famous Las Animas Partition Suit (Henry Miller vs Massey Thomas et. al) It took nearly a decade to settle the suit, eventually settling the land titles to 260 parcels of property. And the result of this suit, thought to be the largest property lawsuit in California history, is the basis of our land titles today.

Sadly the historic home burned down in 1977. Some readers may remember Lynn and Jean Lance, both Gilroy teachers, and their five children who lived in the Massey Thomas Homestead from 1963 to 1977. They furnished this photo of the house which was located between the pathway and the new houses on Luchessa. Do you think the site and story deserve recognition?
